BACKGROUND

Members of the Protein Kinase C (PKC) family are serine/threonine protein kinases that play a key regulatory role in a number of cellular functions including cell growth and differentiation, hormone secretion, and gene expression. Multiple genes and alternative splicing result in three subfamilies, which differ in their co-factor requirements: conventional PKC isoforms (α, β1, β2, and γ) which require calcium and phosphatidylserine (PS), diacylglycerol (DAG) or phorbol esters for activation; novel isoforms (δ, ε, η, and θ), which are calcium-independent but are still regulated by PS, DAG, or phorbol esters; and atypical isoforms (ι / λ, and ζ), which are calcium-independent and do not require PS, DAG, or phorbol esters for activation. PKC β2 regulation of c-myc expression has been shown to suppress insulin gene transcription in pancreatic β-cells implicating PKC β2 for some of the β-cell glucose toxicity found in diabetes.
